Communication - The name of the game

Grand Master's new year red-letter day message: Loan paid out

In his first communication to Brethren for 2020, the Grand Master MWBro Dr Neil Jensen shared, as a priority, the bad news about the bushfires, but he also delivered good news announcing that the Masonic Homes had been formally placed in the hands of the liquidators to be wound up. He announced that the ~\$2.25 million mortgage against 254 North Terrace has been paid out, the accounts paid, tax paid and residual assets distributed.

The Grand Master wrote, "Sincere thanks to the Company Directors, the Company Secretary and Executive Assistant for their fine work in achieving this and all pro bono, by the Directors. Thank you also to all members for your patience and confidence in our ability to perform this task to your satisfaction. The Bonds have now been issued and secured against 254 North Terrace. This represents considerable savings in interest payment per year and moves us closer to

a balanced budget. The rolling \$300,000 odd yearly deficits are now a part of our sad financial history.

We continue to look for efficiencies in membership services by modernising office procedures and Lodge/ Grand Secretariat administrative requirements. Information technology systems are being enhanced. Again, I thank you for your patience and cooperation. These positive changes have been a long time coming. Thank you to our Board of Management members, two Grand Secretaries, the Assistant Grand Master and all who have helped and are continuing to volunteer their services."

The Grand Master also advises that now the bonds had been issued, the refurbishment of 254 North Terrace had commenced. The Project Manager is RWBro Brenton Leitch PAGM who has now taken up office on the ground floor of the Grand Lodge.

Appeal donations from our UK and New Caledonian brothers

The United Kingdom Masonic Chariable Foundation has donated \$150,000 to help people affected by the catastrophic and ongoing Australian bushfires. The donation will be given as three \$50,000 grants to the Australian Freemasons' Disaster Relief Funds in each of the three states most affected by the blaze - NSW, Victoria and South Australia.

The provincial Grand Master of New Caledonia Grande Loge Nationale Française, RWBro Christian Juvigny also represented his constituency in donating \$15,000 to bushfire appeals across Australia, with \$3,000 being sent to the appeals in each of the Australian Grand Lodges. RWBro Juvigny said "We decided to help you modestly by collecting from the Brothers of the Lodges of the Provincial Grand Lodge of New Calédonia and raised AUD\$ 15,000.

The representative for the Grand Lodge of the United Grand Lodge of England, Past Grand Master MW Bro David Fewster (pictured above left) was thrilled to present an additional donation of \$50,000 made by the United Grand Lodge of England to the the Grand Master, MW Bro Dr Neil Jensen, for the Grand Master's Drought and Bushfire Appeal. The expression of brotherly love and relief to the brethren and people affected in the catastrophic bushfires has been gratefully acknowledged.

The Grand Master Dr Neil Jensen emailed his "Positive New Year Message" to all Freemasons. Some points in that email are repeated here in brief because of their importance.

"Temple" update needs support

Unfortunately very few Lodges have made any voluntary contribution to the "beautification of the temple". This is a project with a budget separate from the refurbishment which centres on the requirement set out in the Dilapidation Report (brought about because, over a number of years, we neglected to maintain our building adequately). Thank you to the Lodges which have seen fit to donate money. We need not accept these buildings which present to the public as tired and old. After all, these are the buildings in which we meet, chat and learn to be positive men in society.

Emphasis on philanthropy and rhetoric

Philanthropy: The desire to promote the welfare of others, expressed especially by the generous donation of money to good causes.

The Masonic Charities Advisory Committee met for the first time on January 10. This represents exciting progress as we prosecute the area concept of philanthropy. One recommendation is already on the "tracing board" for the Masonic Charities Board's consideration at their meeting on Wednesday January 15.

The Directors of Masonic Charities, the Company Secretary and the Executive Assistant have prioritised their work by initially establishing a strong investment portfolio; next the distribution policy is being consolidated.

Attention will now be turned to fundraising – a requirement of the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission. This is a specialised field of endeavour. It will need its own budget. As a Director, I will anticipate an initial loss, as procedures are put in place, before ongoing success. This is not unusual as those experienced in formal fundraising at large company level are well aware.

Rhetoric: Language designed to have a persuasive or impressive effect.

The second of our arts and sciences referred to in the second degree comes to mind with fundraising: namely rhetoric. This science allows us to present our ideas in such order as to influence the judgement and sway the feelings of others. Your Directors, all experienced Freemasons, will be applying this science to develop a highly successful fundraising arm of Masonic Charities.

On your behalf, I extend my thanks to the Directors, Company Secretary and Executive Assistant for their devotion to the success of this company; again, all of the Directors work is probono (no cost).

Efficiency and cost effectiveness

Please support our teams to help our Organisation be more efficient; more cost effective; to modernise in keeping with

expectations in this era of rapid technological change; and expedient communication. Garry Holzer spoke at the Community Relations meeting on January 23 outlining the mind-blowing changes being worked out to improve communications throughout Grand Lodge and Freemasonry.

How many Lodges & Districts are needed?

Please start asking the difficult questions in your Lodges; do we need so many Lodges, and do we need so many Districts? As we have worked hard to turn our Organisation around, balance the books and refurbish North Terrace, we will now be stepping up our interest through you and your Lodges to develop a more positive image. However, to refurbish Lodge buildings costs money. The Lodges belong to you; the image belongs to Freemasonry in general. "The great oak was once a little acorn who held its ground". We can and we will.

National trial of free on-line exercise guide for men with advanced prostate cancer




There is now strong evidence that supervised exercise not only reduces side effects of treatment, such as fatigue, but it also results in better survival of men being treated for advanced prostate cancer. Supervised, individually prescribed exercise for people with chronic conditions including cancer should only be provided by exercise physiologists, to ensure safety and effectiveness. The costs and lack of access to exercise physiology services are, however, barriers to uptake.

One of the remits of the FFCMH is to improve men's access to health services that meet their needs and preferences. FFCMH PhD candidate, Ms Holly Evans, who is a practicing exercise physiologist, is passionate about delivering exercise therapy to those who need it and she has developed a free on-line Exercise (prescription) Guide for men with advanced prostate cancer.

After three years in development, Holly and colleagues have, in January 2020, started recruiting men into a 12 month national clinical trial to formally evaluate their on-line Exercise Guide for safety, feasibility and effect. The prescribed exercise is tailored to the individual man, using inbuilt alorithms.

Obesity complicates prostate cancer risk test

Data from the MAILES study which is tracking the health of men living in the north-western suburbs of Adelaide has uncovered a new finding that may have implications for how prostate cancer risk is assessed.



Centre researchers from the population health and prostate cancer teams measured prostate specific antigen (PSA) levels in the blood of men who were normal weight and obese and found that obesity reduces PSA levels through dilution and hormonal effects. They modelled the data to conclude that there may be a delay of approximately four years before the cut-off PSA value used by GPs to suggest prostate cancer risk is reached. Cut-off values for assessing risk may need to be modified to consider the man's weight.

Murray Bridge Combined Masonic Lodges

Since December 1985, the Murray Bridge Combined Masonic Lodges, which originally including Murray Bridge Lodge No 44, Lodge of Sincerity No 120 and Mypolonga Lodge No 121, have awarded an educational scholarship to a Year 12 student seeking to continue tertiary education.

The Freemason's Foundation, one of the charitable arms of the Grand Lodge of South Australia and the Northern Territory, has matched, dollar for dollar, the amount donated by the Lodges. Since the inception of the Scholarship, this endeavour has seen more than \$40,000 awarded to Year 12 students in the Murray Bridge district.

Keeghan Davis of the Murray Bridge High School, one of several students of various schools in the district who applied, was awarded the 2019 (34th) Murray Bridge Combined Mason Lodges Scholarship.

Keeghan succeeded in achieving an outstanding Year 12 grade score and was accepted into Flinders University to undertake a degree in bioengineering, his first choice.

At a Christmas function at the Masonic Lodge Complex on Mulgundawa Road on December 21, 2019, Keeghan was presented with his Scholarship Certificate by WBro Brendan Watts, Master of The Murray Bridge United Lodge No 44, and the Scholarship cheque for \$4000 by WBro Anthony Pahl, OAM, Master of the Mypolonga Lodge No 121.

The ceremony, attended by Keegan's parents and siblings, and Freemasons and their families, was introduced by VWBro. Graham Coulter who has been the Scholarship Coordinator for 30 years.

Hearing, the key to good communication

Brethren: We regularly sit, work and perform charitable works together. One of the key resources we possess is the ability to communicate effectively and engage with each other.

Our ability to truly understand each other exists in successfully conveying or sharing our thoughts, ideas and feelings. When we cannot communicate efficiently due to hearing problems we often run the risk of social frustration and losing the deep connections we make.

In brief, hearing loss is a "social loss" with reported effects of mild hearing loss impacting our quality of life creating emotional reactions such as isolation, anxiety and embarrassment.

This leads to behavioral reactions, such as bluffing, blaming and withdrawing and finally, cognitive reactions, such as confusion, difficulty focusing and decreased self-esteem.

Hearing is the "key" sense to maintain our connections with each other. Hearing loss is treatable and I encourage those who suffer to seek assistance. For those who watch others struggle to hear and engage, please encourage your brothers

to seek help and becomepart of the conversation again.

Robert Dempsey, CEO of the Royal Society for the Blind, has received a defibrillator-for the society's Noarlunga offices from the Southern Freemasons Inc.

In accepting the donation from the Chairman Richard Flashman, Robert related a recent incident in which at a hotel he witnessed a man having a heart attack. He acted promptly and assisted off-duty medical personnel in applying CPR to the patient.

An ambulance was called and paramedics arrived about 20 minutes later who found the patient was not responding.

The paramedics applied a defibrillator and the patient was transported to hospital. The outcome remains unknown.

"Ashlee has demonstrated inspirational commitment to her studies, her family




